Rector's Thoughts

Reverend Stephen Winter Rector of St. Andrew's, Ombersley and St Mary's, Doverdale (and five other churches in the Benefice)



It has been great fun writing this piece for the parish magazines each month over the last six years and by the time you read this I will be plodding along the paths of the Camino del Norte, the pilgrim's path to Santiago da Compostela in northern Spain. I have never been much good at sitting on a beach but I hope to walk along one or two.

I wrote my first piece for the Christmas edition of 2018 and I have tried to write something that brings a reflection based upon my Christian faith on issues of contemporary life. Sometimes it has been on a major event such as the Russian invasion of Ukraine, the Covid epidemic, on the death of the Queen and the coronation of the new King. Sometimes it has been on wider cultural issues such as the future of the countryside and of the human race itself. I wrote about what the influencers of Silicon Valley are saying about this. Developments in robotics and in artificial intelligence suggest that things are moving very quickly in this regard.

In the time that I have been working with you all as Rector of these parishes my conviction has deepened that in a time of great change our roots need to go down deep or we will get swept away in the flood, blown away in the storm. Another piece of writing that I have done every week in my time here has been a reflection on the readings from the bible that are read in church each Sunday. I am writing this piece just before Sunday 4th August, the Tenth Sunday after Trinity. In the Letter to the Ephesians St Paul tells us that the work of the Church is to give us this kind of stability, to stop us being "tossed to and fro and blown about" by the latest fashionable idea or by trickery.

In this fast-changing world we need something that will last. Our parish churches have been a part of the landscape of this land for well over a thousand years. In that time almost everything else has come and gone. The castles that were built around the same time are either ruined or have become museums. Our churches are still alive and the reason that they are alive is because in every community up and down the land there are people who care about them who want to pass them on to the next generation in good order.

It is worth saying here that our churches do not receive a single penny from any official source. If there is a church in your village it is because the people of that village think

that it is worth the effort to keep it alive. It is there because people love it and they love what it says to them. That there is something deeper, more good, more true and more beautiful than the tawdry business of getting and spending.

There have been some influential voices in recent years, including a former editor of The Times, who have argued that our churches ought to be taken out of the hands of The Church and given to a government agency. This has happened in France. I think that they are just plain wrong. They seem to think that the Church is some institution with offices in Westminster alongside other institutions. That is plain wrong as well. The Church is little groups of people in every community who care about their church and about the life of that community. It is a beautiful and very local miracle wherever you find it and that miracle is right there in your community.

It has been a huge privilege to have been a part of this crazy and beautiful act of love over the last six years. I have loved this work and I will miss it, and even more, these wonderful communities, very much. Sadly, I am running out of energy pretty fast and I think that the task requires someone with more of that energy than I have. Please welcome them as you have welcomed me and please love the church where you live and, even more importantly, love one another.

Wishing Rev'd Stephen Winter a long and happy retirement

Last month Rev'd Stephen Winter, our much loved and respected Minister retired from his role of Rector for the Severn Parishes. An informal bring-and-share lunch was held at Ombersley Church on Sunday 4th August after Stephen's last service there as Rector. Blessed with a pleasantly sunny afternoon, we sat outside surrounded by some splendid homemade dishes, desserts and cakes.

After the lunch we thanked Stephen and his wife Laura for looking after us with such kindness and dedication during the past six years, helping us through the highs of the King's Coronation and the lows of COVID-19. P.S. Stephen's final service across the Benefice was held at Elmley Lovett on Sunday 24th August followed by refreshments and a leaving presentation and gift from all Severn parishes.

St Andrew's Church



We are a welcoming church with a variety of services and activities. St Andrew's is part of a Benefice of seven Parishes with Doverdale, Hartlebury, Elmley Lovett, Elmbridge, Hampton Lovett and Rushock.

The church is the focus for worship and celebration in the village, with regular Sunday services and special events throughout the year, and benefits from a room available for use at the west end. The church is a fine example of the work of architect Thomas Rickman. Completed in 1829, it copies 14th century styles with a high, stone-vaulted ceiling and unique stained-glass windows. The chancel of the former 13th century church

survives in the churchyard and is now a Sandys family mausoleum.

Update from the Bell Tower

It seems an incredibly long time since the discovery of a crack in the tenor bell - and it is! 10 months so far. The end is in sight, but when?

The damaged tenor was removed on the 23rd July as the photographs show. A tricky procedure taking up most of the day. The bell had to be freed from its mountings on the bell frame, manoeuvred through four separate hatches and lowered the 70 feet to the ground in the west porch. With the assistance of Bill Arnold and his forklift, it was then placed onto the truck and taken away.

The stage is therefore set, ready to rehang the new bell. But, a further delay has occurred as the recast tenor proved to be unsatisfactory and a subsequent recasting took place on the 15th August. I am hopeful that the new bell will be in situ by the second week in September and full ringing will recommence. To get the clock functioning will take a little longer. The clock assembly need to be reconstructed and the specialist engineers to come to reset it.



Our grateful thanks go out to all who have contributed towards the £29,000 overall cost of this project, although there does remain a shortfall. August has also seen the Parish Councillors take a welcome break from all that goes on behind the scenes, or have they? Not so! In response to youngsters inspired by the Olympics and their request for a table tennis facility, Councillors have been busy putting plans in place for the installation of a permanent table-tennis table on the Memorial Field next to the play area. All being well, we hope to have the table up and running in time for half-term. So, kids of all ages be ready with your ping-pong bats and balls!

You may also have noticed the Weighbridge Hut has benefitted from refurbishment and a fresh lick of paint which hopefully will see it enrich the village for many a year to come. In the autumn, work will commence on improving the surrounding garden area for all to sit and watch the world pass by!

Residents at The Hamptons were also delighted to take receipt of a brand-new replacement bench and tables which arrived just in time to enjoy the fantastic weather and dining al-fresco, thanks to the efforts of Arthur Turner. Arthur also oversaw the British Legion brass plaque restored to its former glory in time for the new bench's arrival.

In addition, in response to residents ongoing concerns regarding speeding at Holt Fleet, Councillors oversaw the installation of a further vehicle activated sign (VAS) by the caravan park approaching the bridge, which now brings the total number of VAS in the village to four. All are helpful deterrents to counter speeding in the village along with the addition of two new village gateways installed at the Crown & Sandys and School Bank. Spot speed checks are also being carried out thanks to West Mercia Police.

As with most parishes up and down the country, petty crime remains a focal point here in the village, more especially fly tipping around our beautiful country lanes. We maintain a regular line of communication with our local policing officers, some of

whom you may have seen or met around the village in recent months in response to our request for increased visibility around the Parish.

POSADA

You may have heard or seen this word in the run up to Christmas and wondered what it's all about!

The word posada means inn or lodging, and traditionally, in Mexico, posadas are a celebration of the Christmas story. The celebration takes place on nine nights from December 16 to 24 and commemorates Mary and Joseph's search for a place to stay where Jesus could be born. Posadas in Mexico feature hot food and drinks, sweets, music, and piñatas.

The Church of England encourages a version of this as a chance to spend an evening with the Nativity characters, storybooks, a candle and more during Advent, the weeks leading up to Christmas. In Ombersley this has now become a tradition. Schools and local families sign up to host Mary & Joseph – small, knitted characters.

The characters, storybooks, candle and more will be blessed at the Advent service on 1st December (Advent Sunday) and will be received back into church on Christmas morning at the Family Service, when Mary and Joseph can be joined by the Baby Jesus.

If you are a family with young(ish) children, this is a great opportunity to 'take some time out' in the busy run up to Christmas. If you are adults only this is a chance to pause and reflect – there are some cards to facilitate this.

CAR SHOW 2024 REVIEW

Take yourselves back to 2019, when only a very few had heard of Covid. We certainly had no idea of the devastation Covid 19 would cause the world with restrictions, lockdowns and sickness.

From March 2020 we were thrust into series of national lockdowns, tiered restrictions including how many people we could socialise with and "bubbles" – remember those!

It wasn't until July 2021 that restrictions were finally lifted, and we could go about our lives as normal. What better time to host a new and exciting event to bring the village back together again?

With the help of car enthusiasts in the village, and an organising team made up of Hall committee members, the Ombersley Car Show was born.

The 2021 event was a car rally whose destination was the Memorial Hall. It attracted nearly 500 paying adult visitors (kids - free) and offered many rare and unusual vehicles, plus a variety of attractions including BBQ food, our famous tea shop selling home baked cakes courtesy of our talented bakers, ice cream and plants, to mention just a few.

Such was the success of the inaugural event, that it was decided to go again in 2022 where footfall increased to nearly 700.

2023 was planned as the biggest yet but was cancelled at the last minute due to adverse weather.

So -2024, with new committee members, and a focus on creating the best yet, we got to work with an emphasis on using social media to create the right "buzz".

It was a HUGE success, with more cars than ever, over 1100 adult visitors, a shopping village, new food and drink offerings, the incredible "Voices Unlimited" and the 2516 Droitwich Squadron RAF Air Cadets Band plus all the usual attractions.

So – Why do we do it?

Ombersley Memorial Hall is a charity and needs a constant income to keep the lights on.

Our regular hirers are the life blood of the Hall, but there is also a need to have funds for repairs and improvements over time. This year, the floor needs to be repaired. So, with the help of our army of volunteers, stallholders and car owners we have a healthy amount to complete the work needed.

Acton Manor, Acton Hall, the Bourne family and Worcester Cathedral



The Actons were an ancient family who predated the Norman Conquest, kept their powder dry and were awarded their own arms; several of them were knights of the realm. The name derives from the Saxon ac (or oak) that grew abundantly in the area. As early as 1307, in the last year of Edward 1st reign the estate was known as Acton Manor of the freehold knight. This branch of the family was known as the Actons of Ombersley and in 1512 were described as having land in the Manor of Acton. In 1582 they built Acton Manor, a hall house facing south with its entrance on the north wall to prevent the bubonic plague finding its way in.

When Walter Acton died without male issue the house and land passed to William and John Barnaby and in a deed of conveyance we find the following description "the aforesaid Manor House called Acton Hall together with the said manor or Lordship of Acton." They were relatives by marriage, the family prospered and in 1673 built a new and much grander Acton Hall a few hundred yards away, complete with moat. Thereafter the old hall was tenanted and little altered apart from the insertion of a floor to create a room above its hall and the relocation of the entrance door to the front of the house. At some point, possibly as early as 1773, it was sold to the Sandys estate with adjoining land. At some point it became known as Lower Acton Farm and with its land was acquired by the county council to create smallholdings for soldiers returning from the Great War. By 1971 it was in poor shape and it was decided to dispose of it with a couple of acres. Reverting to its historic name my wife and I bid successfully at auction and we lived there until her death many years later.

The Hall meanwhile had a less happy future. The Barnabys in turn passed it to another relative, Richard Bourne, in whose family it remained for over two centuries. In the 1850's there was an outbreak of scarlet fever in the house and in desperation the present Hall was built to replace it and it was fired. As something of a railway buff, I should perhaps mention that in 1931 the Great Western Railway built locomotive number 4982 and named it Acton Hall. It was withdrawn in 1962 but its nameplates escaped the cutter's torch and come up at auction from time to time.

The Bournes were great letter writers and some of these scripts have come down through the years; they are housed within the County Council archives. Many deal with the usual inconsequentia, but there are some fascinating glimpses into the life of those times. They were well educated and their script is as clear to read today as it was all those years ago.

From H Bourne to a sister, January 14th (no year):

Mr Bright was some time since declared a bankrupt. I heartily pity his wife and indeed all her family. We hear that one of her sisters has five, the other six hundred pounds in his hands, but their security is a mortgage. I wish it may prove a good one...

The untimely end of poor Mr. Clacton...was a most dreadful affair; he had been hunting, dined at the Hundred House and stayed until about ten o'clock on a very dark night, having sent his huntsman and dogs home before. He went home designing to go a way that was nearer than the common road and being a very bold rider (even to rashness indeed) he pushed his horse on at the brink of a coal pit and it is supposed that by dint of spurs he forced him on when the horse made so great a leap that he had cleared the pit, but the ground on the other side being false gave way under him which unavoidably threw him backwards with his rider to the bottom of the pit which was a vast depth...he was not found until the evening of the next day... (the horse survived)!

I have heard nothing jovial but Mr Barnaby's wedding, which was celebrated with open housekeeping at Brockhampton and the poor of that parish, that which the Lady came from, and Bromyard, had a very reasonable share in his bounty...

From H Bourne to a sister, July 22nd (no year):

This morning we arrived home from a ball made by Lady Dashwood to oblige Lady Ann Hamilton... We had an agreeable set (nine couples), sometimes made ten by the little folks. It was in the Oxfordshire and not Worcestershire style... We sat down to supper, twenty at one table that was magnificently covered but the number of things I will not pretend to guess at. There were two grand tureens of soup, one at the top and the other at the bottom of the table. The first removed for a dish of carp, the latter for pike...

From Isabella Bourne, June 25th 1756:

We had the most dreadful afternoon yesterday that I have ever seen for thunder lightning and rain. The latter I imagine was like what sailors call a waterspout for no one here ever saw anything like it before. About four o'clock was the time it began. It was as dark as if it had been ten at night. In a few minutes the rain forced itself into every room in the house, in less than half an hour the court both gravel and grass was almost covered with water. In about the same space of time the water in both the moats rose to a level with the pathway over the bridge, near half of one side of it was broke down by the violence of the torrent.

From ? Bourne, June 25th 1756: My sister and I got home just as the clock struck midnight...We had a very safe and tolerably pleasant drive as it was a clear night, it was a good driving light the whole time, especially as it was a road that both the coachman and horses were acquainted with. The darkest time was between Hawford and Ombersley... Our friends the Shillingfleets are about to start their journey next Monday (29th that is), Mr Shillingfleet, his son and two elder daughters. They are to travel two in a chair and two on horseback. I suppose he will himself take up one place in a vehicle and Miss Molly I fancy cannot possibly ride on horseback...

Mrs B has sent to engage lodgings at Oxford for the Commemoration. We are uncertain whether we shall as we proposed travel in the Post Chaises or in the Machine that is new set up to go three times a week to London. It sets out from the Bell in Broad Street at five o'clock in the morning and gets to Oxford the same evening...

From Hannah Bourne, September 26th 1760: (Coronation of King George III).

We spent the day of the coronation with Mr. Shillingfleet who gave his friends a very handsome dinner of fourteen dishes and made them drink their Majesties health in burgundy...

From Isabella Bourne, November 12th 1769:

We do most sincerely congratulate you and my sister on her happy delivery and rejoice to hear that both mother and child are in so fair a way of doing well... Time will permit me to add no more (without making the coach wait) than all our most affectionate regards...

So where does Worcester Cathedral come into this?

Several of the Bournes are buried there – Judith Bourne (died 1745) is in the cloisters as is Hannah (died 1798). Next time you are there, go down to the crypt and you will find a floorstone commemorating not only Hannah, but also Isabella Bourne (though without an age given we can't know whether or not the Isabella it refers to is the Isabella who wrote the above letter).
