Tenor Bell Update

On the 25th September, Whites (Bellhangers) returned with the newly recast and tuned tenor.

Over the ensuing two days, the bell and headstock were restored to the position within the bell frame along with reinstating the headstock on the 4th bell. The clappers were replaced into all 6 bells. What remained was replacing the four hatches, refitting the pulleys and ropes, and putting everything in place to enable the bells to be fully functional.

I hope when you read this, all will have been completed and full ringing recommenced. Unfortunately, the clock will stay out of action for a little while longer.

In my article in the September parish magazine, I appealed for further contributions to support this restoration work. I am now pleased to announce that through your generosity, including a significant anonymous donation, donations from the Ombersley Conservation Trust, the Sandys Trust, the Richardson Foundation and the W & DCRA belfry repair fund, we have reached our target. Ombersley and Doverdale Parish Council: October 2024

September saw Councillors reconvene following the summer break, although as you'll have read in last month's article, I use the word 'break' loosely given their continued sterling efforts behind the scenes!

With the maintenance and repairs to the Weighbridge hut now complete, work has continued to equip the interior with furnishings sympathetic to when it was last in use as the Weighbridge office back in the early 1950s. With the hut now ready to open its doors once more, this time as a 'drop-in' facility for local groups, do be sure to peek through the door window when you're next passing to be transported back in time. As mentioned in last month's article, we're always keen to respond to requests from residents, and I'm pleased to report last month saw an order placed with Wychavon District Council for both replacement and new dog fouling and litter bins in the village, including the addition of a dog foul bin at Turn Mill, a popular spot for dog walkers. Keep an eye out too for new bins in both the play area and Memorial Hall field.

Have you ever wondered who's responsible for the clearing of drains and ditches, vegetation and fallen trees in the Parish? If so, the answer is our Parish Lengthsman, Paul Brewer, who I'm sure you'll notice over the coming months, hastily clearing debris from our drains to keep them free-flowing. When it comes to the clearing of weeds, leaves, lawn mowing and all things gardening, Ian Ballard is our Parish Gardener. Between them, both Paul and Ian play their part in keeping the village and Parish running smoothly and looking tiptop, so next time you're passing, be sure to say hello!

Also, Councillors conduct a weekly inspection of the play area, to ensure the safety and maintenance of the equipment, so if you do spot any equipment in need of TLC, do please bring it to our attention. The same is true of any other furniture of fixings in the village, as was the case when a damaged pane of glass was reported to the Clerk in the bus shelter opposite the Doctors' Surgery, which was swiftly actioned and repaired.

And finally, don't forget to keep an eye on All About Ombersley and on social media for updates of what's on in your Parish, one example being an apple pressing event on the 12th October at the Memorial Hall between 11am and 3pm.

New ideas and suggestions are always welcome as to how the Parish Council can improve your village and parish.

WEST MIDLANDS POLICE FIGHT RISE OF 'FRIGHTENING' 100MPH STREET CAR RACING

Force says events attended by hundreds of spectators leave residents in distress at loud noise and dangerous driving. **Guardian headline February 2024**

In 1890: THE OUTCOME OF A TROTTING MATCH Reported in the Worcestershire Chronicle, 9 August 1890

Herbert Sidney, a brewer's pupil, of Britannia square, Worcester, was summoned for furiously driving a horse and carriage at Ombersley and also with cruelly driving a horse early on the 17th ult.* Mr. Tree defended.

JOSEPH ATKINS said that on the day in question he saw defendant in a skeleton cart driving at the rate of 15 or 16 miles an hour. The horse was in a dreadful state, the sweat rolled off it, and it panted very badly. Defendant drove to the danger of the public. He believed defendant was engaged in a trotting match with another person.

THOMAS CHANCE said he saw two skeleton traps and a man on horseback pass his garden. The horses were trotting very fast and appeared to be racing. After the carts passed him one of the horses went into a gallop. He considered the carts were going at a dangerous pace. In reply to Mr. Tree, witness said when they came back, the horses were in a very distressed condition.

WILLIAM PREECE, postmaster, of Ombersley stated that hearing a noise he went outside his house and saw a cart with a wheel off. There was another trap, which defendant drove. The horses were very distressed and he had never seen horses so distressed in his life. The sweat ran off the horses like water out of a watering can. He called it gross cruelty to the horses the way they had been over-driven.

Mr. TREE said that the essence of the charge was that the horses were driven to the danger of the public. He submitted that at five o'clock in the morning, when the driving was taking place, there was no one about in the country roads, and, therefore, there could not have been any danger to the public.

Mr. HERBERT PRESTON, Lowesmoor, stated that defendant and a Mr. Wilson and himself went out at four o'clock in the morning for a drive. Defendant and Mr. Wilson were in traps and witness rode. It took them three quarters of an hour to go seven

miles and a half, and there was no racing. Neither of the horses was distressed, nor did they perspire very much. There was not the least danger to the public.

In answer to the Deputy Chief Constable WITNESS admitted that Mr. Wilson had a mile start, and that witness was at the third mile stone to take the time. He knew the defendant's horse had trotted 14 miles in 55 minutes, and he knew that Mr. Wilson's horse had done two mils in eight minutes.

Frank S. Wilson, the driver of the other horse, was summoned for a similar offence. When in Ombersley village one of the wheels of the cart came off, and the defendant was thrown out. The horse was injured by getting its leg over the shaft. The evidence was the same in both cases.

Mr. SIDNEY gave evidence for the defence. He denied that he was going at more than 11 miles an hour. His horse was not distressed. In reply to the magistrates' clerk, he said he had backed his horse to do 14 miles an hour, but it would only do that when pressed, and on this occasion it was not pressed at all.

The Bench thought it was clearly proved that the horses were racing, and that it was dangerous to the public, and therefore they were fined £1 each and costs. Both cases of cruelly driving the horses were withdrawn on defences paying the costs. Sidney had to pay altogether £2. 11s., Wilson £2. 9s., and Mr. Preston, who was similarly summoned, was ordered to pay the costs 6s.

SOS in Hallow

No, there's not been an emergency in Hallow! SOS stood for the "Super Ounslow Special". Later on, that became "Success On Success", and finally "So Obviously Superior".

So, what was "so obviously superior," and why Hallow? In 1927 an interesting character called Len Vale-Ounslow set up a motorbike factory in Hallow. This was the heyday of British motorcycling with famous names such as Ariel, BSA, AJS, Brough, Matchless and Triumph, to name but a few, with the Midlands, especially Birmingham and Coventry, as the main centres of production.

Len was born in Sutton Coldfield, probably in 1900, the eighth of nine children to Frank, a master builder, and Emily, owner of a brass foundry in Hockley. In 1908 his brothers built a prototype aeroplane to which they strapped 8-year old Len and launched him down a steep slope. The flight ended with Len crashing to the ground and remaining unconscious for days. It is to this that he attributed his daredevil attitude to life and motorcycling.



The family business moved to Worcester and Len managed a branch in Hallow. He soon started building motorbikes for his friends, before starting а production factory. However, there was no gas supply to Hallow, so Len used a new technology of welding tubes to make a frame instead of brazing lugs to steel tubes. This significantly lightened his bikes compared with others and gave improved performance. It is the method still used today and owes its development to the work Len did in Hallow.

Len rode in most of the speed and reliability trials, which were popular in the 1920s and his daredevil attitude to risk gave him the success he needed to promote his motorcycles.

Finally, in 1932 the factory moved to Birmingham as getting raw materials to Hallow proved an increasing problem. Production continued until 1939 when World War 2 put an end to the manufacture of the "SOS".

In 2005, Len Vale-Ounslow claimed to be the world's oldest motorcyclist, riding down the Mall on his hundredth birthday to meet the Queen. Interestingly, he had also claimed to be 100 in 1999 when newspapers reported him as the "oldest motorcyclist" and again in 2003, when he claimed to still be 100. He was awarded an MBE in 1995, and appeared on an episode of "This is your Life". He was still riding motorbikes until he was 102, finally dying in 2004 at Hallow.

Living in Ombersley

September 2024

My name is Yurii, and I am a Ukrainian refugee who came to Britain after the Russian invasion. I've lived in Ombersley for the past two and a half years, attended RGS, passed my A-Levels, and now I'm going to the University of Sussex in Brighton to study computer science.

Before I leave, I thought it would be a great idea to write a thank you article in the parish magazine about how grateful I am for the luck and opportunity to be living in a lovely place like Ombersley. After the invasion of Ukraine, I have lived with Sue and Rick Johns and got the chance to know many more wonderful people in the village.

From the start I was invited to various events and festivities which made me realise how strong and connected the local community is. Everyone seems to get involved and support each other. I felt included and respected by people of all ages. Ombersley & Doverdale Tennis Club gave me the chance to learn how to play tennis and attend regular practices. I had a really good time and made some of my first friends and connections there which I really value.

Local people gave me the opportunity to earn some pocket money by helping with various small jobs like watering plants or lawn mowing, even looking after tortoises. At all times, there were people checking up on me curious to know about how my family is doing and my personal well-being. Countless times I was offered support, financial or emotional, and on a few occasions people took me out for dinner, and I appreciated the opportunity to try tasty food from our local pubs.

There were things I couldn't have done on my own. For instance, with my passion for basketball, I wouldn't have been able to go to practices if I didn't have people who volunteered to give me a lift. What impressed me even more is that it would always be late evening hours, despite it being a normal time to have your dinner, they still showed up for me.

I've never seen a community like this before and I'm always happy when somebody asks me, something like, where do you live in England because I get an opportunity to tell them all about a wonderful place called Ombersley. I have received so much help since leaving Kyiv in 2022 that I hope one day to be able to pay back and help others in need.

Itinerant Preachers in Ombersley

The Battle of Gheluvelt or how the Worcestershire Regiment saved the First World War from being lost to the Germans.

In 1914, the Germans invaded France. Their aim was to overwhelm the French and British Armies, bypass Paris and seize the Channel Ports. Only the British Army remained at Ypres to stem the advancing German Army and save the Channel Ports and Paris.

The crux of the Battle of Ypres hinged on the village of Gheluvelt, in Belgium, which was the last position held by the British, preventing a major breakthrough by the German Army and the collapse and rout of the Allied Forces.

By noon on the 31st October, the Queens, the Royal Scots Fusiliers, the Welsh and the Kings Royal Rifles had been overwhelmed. Gheluvelt had been lost and a gap opened in the British lines. So serious was the situation that orders had been prepared for a general retreat of the British Army.

The Second Battalion of the Worcestershire Regiment was the last reserve, all other forces having been committed and lost. At 1pm, the order came to save Gheluvelt. The Battalion advanced through the straggling and wounded men retreating, over decimated terrain and up onto the ridge overlooking the village. Immediately the German artillery targeted them and over 100 men were wounded or killed. Down the slope of the ridge the remaining men charged into the German forces, who were concentrated in the grounds of the village's chateau. Overwhelmed by the ferocity of the Worcestershires' attack, the German forces retreated. Gheluvelt had been saved and the line restored.

If the Worcestershire Regiment had not turned the battle, routing the Germans, there would have been no obstruction to the German Army taking Northern France and the war might have been lost. It is rare that the action of one unit can exert such a profound influence as did this now famous counter attack.

The 2nd Worcestershires, commanded by Major E. B. Hankey went into action with about 370 men, of whom 187 were killed or wounded. Gheluvelt Park on the Barboune Road, out of Worcester stands as a memorial to their bravery on that day.


