### Letter from the Rector

Reverend Canon Tim Williams Rector of St. Andrew's, Ombersley and St Mary's, Doverdale (and five other churches in the Benefice)



#### Dear Friends

As I write this, I am just beginning my time as your Rector, and Lent has just begun. Some of you may think I am your Lenten penance! Mary and I would like to thank you for your welcome and we look forward to getting to know you.

As you read this we are just over half way through Lent. As you know, Lent is a season of reflection, a time to prepare our hearts for the great joy of Easter. It is a journey that takes us through the wilderness, through moments of self-examination, prayer, and perhaps even the challenge of giving something up. But Lent is not the destination - Easter is.

I'm reminded of a story about a little girl who was watching a butterfly struggle to emerge from its cocoon. Wanting to help, she gently peeled back the layers, but to her dismay, the butterfly's wings remained weak, and it never flew. What she didn't realise was that the struggle was necessary - the effort of breaking free strengthened the butterfly's wings for flight.

In many ways, this is what Lent and Easter teach us. The struggles we face, the times of waiting and difficulty, are not without purpose. They prepare us for the new life and hope that Easter brings. Jesus's journey through suffering to resurrection shows us that beyond the darkest moments, God's love is at work, bringing transformation and renewal.

So, as we move through these last days of Lent, let us not lose sight of the joy ahead. Easter is coming - a time of celebration, new beginnings, and the promise that, in Christ, life conquers death, and hope triumphs over despair. I look forward to celebrating my first Easter with you, may it be a very happy and blessed.

Why are chasubles worn in church and what are they? Chasubles are worn in church as a symbol of the priest's role in celebrating the Eucharist. They represent the yoke of Christ, reminding the priest of their call to humility, service, and love. The chasuble is also a continuation of ancient liturgical tradition, dating back to the early Church when it was a common outer garment. Over time, it became a distinct vestment reserved for the celebration of the Eucharist.

Chasubles can vary in style, with some reflecting the Gothic, Roman, or modern designs. They are often made from high-quality fabrics, embroidered with Christian symbols, and follow the liturgical colour scheme (e.g., purple for Lent, white for Easter and Christmas, green for Ordinary Time).

I have a set of vestments some of which I designed and were made for me by my mother-in-law so you may notice that I will wear them reminding me as I stated above.

### **Christingle Celebration**

In February the Christingle Service held in St Andrew's church was a lovely, joyful occasion where everyone made their own Christingle, originally a Moravian church tradition. An orange represents the world, with sweets showing the good things the earth offers and a candle is lit to symbolise that Jesus is the light of the world. During the service money was raised for The Children's Society, a charity that was formed way back in Victorian times by a young man who was shocked by the conditions some children and young people were living in. For over one hundred and forty years, with the generosity of generations of supporters, originally via the Church of England, fundraising has been a very necessary way of keeping the charity going.

For many years St Andrew's church community has raised money for this worthwhile cause. This year a total of £386.73 was collected, which will go towards supporting

children and young people who are going through difficult and traumatic times; children who are caring for parents or siblings; and children who have been abused or abandoned.

- A big thank you to Arthur Turner for contacting me re. the Origins of the Water Tower. Up until 1947 almost all of the houses in Ombersley had their own wells or shared a well and water was pumped up by hand from the nearby borehole on the Sandys estate. In 1947/48 the local government put in plans for 24 houses to be built in Apple Tree Walk. They realized that these post-war houses could not each have a well, so the Sandys estate agreed to build the Water Tower and Pumping station to bring the water up from the borehole and into the village. Apparently, Arthur said that there was a large water tank situated in the Conker Field (aka Wedding Field) which was used to store water for the emergency services to access. He did say that sometimes on Bonfire Night the local children might pop the occasional banger inside the huge tank so that it made a louder noise. Some things never change!

# Hereford's *MAPPA MUNDI* - circa 1290s ... and why it's so highly regarded today

There are reportedly over 1000 mediæval *mappae mundi* ... maps of the world ... still in existence but what singles Hereford's *Mappa Mundi* out from all the rest is not only its size, just over 5<sup>ft</sup> by 4<sup>ft</sup>, but also the amazing detail of all its component parts: the three known continents {Europe, Africa & Asia} at the time of it compilation in the 1290s; over 420 towns & cities worldwide; 32 races of humans ... some very weird and wonderful, particularly those in the far flung parts of the Earth; 31 animals; just 2 plants; 8 mythological creatures; and 15 references to biblical characters / events.

It was most likely drawn up somewhere near Lincoln, the map producing centre at the time, by Richard of Holdingham on a specially selected calf's skin (vellum). It would have been much lighter in colour and all the drawings done using oak gall ink but also including some vibrant colouring, red and blue, as well as gold-leaf overlay in places. Over the years it has darkened and to some extent become wrinkled. The three major land masses are drawn in a circle, not because people at that time thought the world

was flat ... a myth perpetuated by the 'flat-earth society' even to this day ... but just as a convenient representation.

The earth is shown rotated 90° anticlockwise to our modern way of thinking, with the East at the top, down to the West at the bottom; hence the labelling of the continents as shown, with the British Isles bottom left rather than top left. The Mediterranean Sea ... the sea in the 'middle of the earth' ... is thus located in an almost vertical central position in the lower part of the map.

It's a truly wonderful map not only for its time but also for the incredible detail ... more of this in another article ... which also includes written explanations in Norman French, the language of the literate elite in the 1290s, in boxes at all angles in order to fit them in between the myriad of little drawings, over 500 ... well worth a trip to Hereford Cathedral to see it in all its faded yet extravagant glory.

### **Parish Council Reflections**

It is not very often that an individual comes along that makes an enormous difference to a community in a noticeably brief time. Sue Collier was without one shadow of a doubt one of the hardest working members of the Parish Council, certainly for a long time. Within four months of joining the Council she became head of planning and not very much passed Sue's eagle eye. Sue then organised a meeting in Ombersley Church, attended by around two hundred residents, to explain the importance of a Neighbourhood Plan, affectionally known as TOAD (Tomorrow's Ombersley And Doverdale). This task she took on with relish, recruiting over fifty residents as volunteers to help produce one of the most respected Neighbourhood Plans ever to be approved by Wychavon.

The Council could well have been financially embarrassed if it had not been for Sue's determination to apply for as many grants as possible. The Memorial Hall would still be surrounded by the prison-like fencing. The children's play area would still have been open to the main field and the car park. The Sandys Memorial gates would not be in position. There would not have been paths to allow people to walk around the field. Benches would not have been ordered and sponsored nor would trees have been planted and the telephone box in the village painted Red.

During the COVID lockdown, Sue was the lynchpin of the helpline which gave comfort and support to so many residents, whilst at the same time she catalogued all the Parish records for posterity.

Even after Sue retired from the Council, she was very heavily involved with the restoration of the weighbridge and garden, which sadly, she will not see completed.

Thank you so much Sue, you are leaving behind a mighty gap to fill, and you will be missed by all sectors of the community.

Our thoughts are with David, her husband, who has lost such an incredibly special and respected lady.

## History and Origins of Golf, Gowf or Kolf

The Scots would have us believe that they invented golf. Their basis for this claim is that a game of hitting pebbles over sand dunes with a stick had been played from time immemorial and that they invented the modern game in the 15<sup>th</sup> century.

However, since the early middle-ages, the Dutch have played a game called "Kolf", where a leather ball was hit into a hole with a stick, the winner using the fewest strokes. Kolf, a Dutch word meaning stick or bat, was first recorded in 1261, in a manuscript of the Dutch poet Jacob van Maerlant. There is a record of another game of golf played on the 26<sup>th</sup> February 1297 in Loenen aan de Vecht, in Holland.

The first mention of golf in Scotland occurs in an Act of Parliament of 1457, 150 years later. At that time, Scotland fearing yet another invasion from the English made military training in archery compulsory for all men. However, playing "Gowf", as it is in Scots, was more popular than military service. The Act was introduced to ban golf and "futball" so that men could fulfil their military obligation.

Despite a subsequent Act of 1491, under James IV<sup>th</sup>, banning golf in Scotland as an "unprofitable sport", the king acquired a set of golf clubs and set a precedent for royal involvement in the game.

On 2<sup>nd</sup> March 1672, Sir John Foulis recorded in his diary that he played golf at Musselburgh Links, just outside Edinburgh. This is accepted as proving that "The Old Links" at Musselburgh is the oldest playing course in the world.

The oldest surviving Golf rule book was published in 1744 for "The Company of Gentlemen Golfers" who played at Leith Links near Edinburgh. The club still exists and this publication entitles them to be known as the oldest golf club. Their rules form the basis for the modern game rules, including "your tee must be upon the ground" and "you are not to change the ball which you strike off the tee."

The Victorian era saw a huge boom in the game, partly through Victoria's interest in Scotland and more from increasing middle-class wealth and mobility. By 1860, a ball made from Gutta Percha, a type of rubber, was cheaper, easier to make and more reliable than the previous feather filled leather ball. With the growth of Empire, the game became the international sport it is today.

So, you decide: should it be golf, gowf or kolf?





## **Pear and Cider Mill in Ombersley**
